MANDATORY ARRIVAL PROCESS GEORGIAN ICENT APP

All students must complete Georgian College's **mandatory** arrival process through the iCent app. This application is available through <u>Apple Store</u> and <u>Google Play</u>.



Follow these instructions to begin using iCent:

1) Download the application to your phone via the hyperlinks above or by searching "iCent" in the Apple Store or Google Play.

2) Enter "Canada" as your destination country and "Georgian College" as your institution name.

3) You are required to log in to iCent using your Georgian email address. A pin code will be forwarded to your college email for log-in purposes.

4) Fill in all the requested information to begin using the Georgian College dashboard.

5) If you are having trouble logging into the app, contact support@icent.app

AIRPORT SUPPORT AND TRANSPORTATION ASSISTANCE

Note: Arranging airport pickup is your responsibility. This service must be booked at least 72 hours before your departure.

In addition, Georgian College does not provide free temporary accommodation. It is crucial to arrange where you plan to stay in advance of your arrival in Canada.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Register for your courses

Full-time registration for courses starts on Aug. 9. To be eligible to register for courses, the following conditions must be met:

- You are admitted into a program (final or conditional);
- Full semester fees are paid; and
- Proof of your approved study permit

Note: For most fall 2023 applicants, it is strongly recommended that full semester fees are paid, and student visa proof or Port of Entry letter is uploaded on the IAS portal by Aug. 3, 2023. If an agent submitted the application on your behalf, they will also be required to complete this step.

Once you have confirmed that you have an approved study visa and paid your fees in full, you will be able to pick your courses. Please check your <u>Banner account</u> for your program-specific registration start date.

Need help with registration and your student systems?

Join the Student Systems Support Hub sessions online via Webex – From Wednesday, August 9, to Monday, September 18. These sessions will show you how to register for courses, change them (add/drop), view your account details, find your timetables, apply for credit transfer, and receive introductions to Blackboard and MyPath.

Work permit for work-related studies


If your program includes a work component such as co-op, field placement, field training, industry placement, practicum, clinical placement, practical experience, or internship (paid or unpaid), then you must obtain a co-op work permit before starting your work term. You can apply for this permit alongside your study permit by using the co-op supporting letter that was included with your acceptance letter.

The conditions allowing you to work off-campus attached to a study permit are **NOT** interchangeable with the requirement to fulfill a work placement related to your studies. You need a separate co-op work permit to complete your work term.

FORMS AND PLACEMENT REQUIREMENTS


Many programs, particularly in Health and Wellness, Community Safety, and Human Services, include placements that require immunization or criminal record checks among other possible requirements. These requirements must be met before your placement starts. It is your responsibility to make sure you are eligible to participate.

GEORGIAN ONECARD



ONEcard, the official identification card of Georgian College, offers a multitude of features beyond a simple ID. It serves as your student card, bus pass (for Barrie students), library card, athletic center card, and a convenient payment method for select vendors both on and offcampus - all consolidated into one card!


Here are the key highlights of ONEcard:

- Provides seamless access to various services.
- Personalize it by submitting your own photo.
- Use it at participating locations to purchase food, beverages, and items at Georgian Stores. Say goodbye to carrying cash and coins, as ONEcard enables swift and contactless transactions.
- Features a flex dollar account that operates on a declining balance system, allowing easy tracking of expenses with each purchase.
- Helps students with planning and budgeting by keeping track of all their spending, from textbooks to daily essentials.
- Easily add funds and track spending 24/7 from anywhere in the world, ensuring control over your expenses. Top up your account online or at most major banks to always guarantee sufficient funds.
- In case of loss or theft, students can quickly deactivate their card to protect their balance.
- For eligible students, the universal bus pass activates 24 hours after receiving your ONEcard, granting unlimited use of Barrie City Transit (Barrie Campus students only).

HEALTH AND DENTAL

As an international student enrolled in a post-secondary program at Georgian College, you have health insurance coverage from Guard.me as well as a health and dental plan from Georgian College Student Association (GCSA's) MyStudentPlan.



Guard.me insurance coverage

The provided insurance coverage is designed to address emergency health conditions and new ailments (such as the flu, sore throat, rash, etc.) that occur after your health insurance coverage is initiated. It is important to note that pre-existing conditions are not covered by this plan. Additionally, you have the option to purchase insurance for any dependents residing with you in Canada.

Guard.me insurance offers coverage for various sudden medical expenses, including:

- Hospital and walk-in clinic visits
- Prescription drugs
- X-rays and lab testing
- Physician and surgeon services
- Psychiatric hospitalization
- Psychotherapy
- Eye exams
- Paramedic services
- Physiotherapy and speech therapy
- Private nursing

- Ambulance services
- Dental treatments for accidental injury and emergencies
- Accessibility services
- Immunization
- Maternity coverage (If the pregnancy occurs after your arrival)
- Air evacuation and return home services
- Trauma counselling

HEALTH AND DENTAL INSURANCE COVERAGE

GCSA / MyStudentPlan coverage

This health and dental plan is intended to cover most non-emergency needs, including dental check-ups, physiotherapy, and massage therapy, among others. Additionally, you have the option to purchase health and dental coverage for your dependents residing with you in Canada.

FINDING A MEDICAL PROFESSIONAL

mobileDOCTOR

For international students, the Guard.me<u>mobileDOCTOR</u> app offers a convenient and accessible way to seek medical advice and assistance. This app lets you connect with qualified healthcare professionals from your mobile device. To utilize the app, simply <u>download it</u> and create an account using your student information. When you need medical guidance, you can schedule virtual appointments, chat with doctors, and receive personalized healthcare advice.

The Guard.me mobile doctor app is a valuable resource that ensures you have convenient access to healthcare services, especially during your time away from home. Stay connected to professional medical support and enjoy peace of mind knowing that you have trusted healthcare at your fingertips.

Medical emergencies

In case of a medical emergency it's crucial to know who to contact for immediate assistance. Dial 911, the emergency hotline, to reach paramedics, police, or fire services in urgent medical emergency situations. They will respond promptly and provide the necessary support.

Additionally, it is recommended to inform the <u>International Education and Development Office</u> about any medical emergencies involving international students. We can offer guidance, connect you with appropriate resources, and provide any necessary assistance during such critical situations. Your well-being is a priority, and knowing the proper channels to reach out to in medical emergencies ensures you receive the necessary help when it matters most.



IMMUNIZATION RECORDS



To make sure you are prepared in case of illness during your stay in Canada, it is strongly advised that you carry an updated immunization record, endorsed by a doctor and officially translated into English. The immunization record should include the following information:

- Generic name of the vaccine (e.g., Diphtheria) rather than just the product or brand name. If possible, include dosage details and the manufacturing lot number of the vaccine.
- Date when each vaccine was administered, including the day, month, and year.
- Complete name of the doctor who administered the vaccine, along with any license or registration number associated with the doctor.
- Full address and contact details of the doctor's clinic or hospital, including the clinic's address, landline phone number, and/or cell phone number.

If you have received vaccinations from different doctors, it is acceptable to have separate records. It is important to bring records of all vaccines you have received. Additionally, it is highly recommended to have records for the following vaccines. Consult with your doctor to determine if any vaccines need updating or if boosters are necessary:

- Tetanus
- Diphtheria
- Polio
- Hepatitis B
- Pertussis (whooping cough)
- Measles, Mumps, and Rubella (MMR)
- Varicella (Chickenpox)
- Any other vaccines you may have received (e.g., BCG, Yellow Fever, Smallpox, etc.)

HOUSING

Finding suitable housing in Canada can be a significant task for international students. To streamline the process and secure a place before your arrival, it is advisable to start your search and secure accommodations before the start of the semester. For comprehensive information and assistance in finding your home away from home, we recommend visiting the <u>housing page</u> on our website, where you'll find valuable resources and guidance.



When exploring housing options, consider the following suggestions:

- <u>On-campus residence</u>: Conveniently live minutes from where you will be taking your classes.
- <u>Places4Students:</u> Georgian College has partnered with Places4Students, a specialized company that focuses on offering off-campus housing solutions tailored to postsecondary students' needs.
- <u>Kijiji</u>: Utilize online platforms like Kijiji, where you can find listings for rental properties, roommates, and sublets in various locations.
- <u>Facebook Marketplace and Groups</u>: Explore Facebook Marketplace and dedicated groups specifically for housing or roommates, as they often have active listings and discussions relevant to your search.
- <u>Homestay</u>: While studying, consider staying with a Canadian family to fully immerse yourself in the culture of the country.
- <u>SpacesShared</u>: Connect with an older individual to help them with daily tasks and also enjoy the companionship of a roommate.

HOUSING INFORMATION



Student Residence



Exercising caution and vigilance is essential when searching for housing. Watch out for <u>potential</u> <u>scams</u> and protect yourself by following these guidelines:

- Verify the information: Thoroughly assess the accuracy of the information provided in listings before committing to anything. Visit the property or conduct video tours if possible.
- **Trust your instincts:** If a deal appears too good to be true or you feel uncomfortable with the landlord or roommates, it's better to move on and find a more reliable option.
- **Read agreements carefully:** Before signing any lease or rental agreements, carefully read and understand the terms and conditions. Seek clarification on any unclear points.
- Be a responsible tenant/roommate: Once you secure housing, strive to be a good tenant or roommate by respecting the property, adhering to lease terms, and maintaining a positive living environment.

Standard leases

It is legal in Ontario to sign a Standardized Lease. The Government of Ontario has set <u>out rules</u> <u>and regulations</u> about what can and cannot be in a lease.

COST OF LIVING

The average cost of living for an international student in Ontario can vary depending on various factors such as the city or town of residence, lifestyle choices, and personal preferences. It's important to note that these figures are approximate and subject to change. Here are some estimated monthly expenses for an international student in Ontario:

- Accommodation: On-campus residence options can range from around \$500 to \$1,200 CAD (Canadian Dollar) per month, depending on the type of room and amenities. Off-campus housing, including shared apartments or renting a room, can range from \$600 to \$1,500 CAD per month.
- **Transportation:** Monthly public transportation passes can cost between \$100 and \$150 CAD, depending on the city and transit system. If you plan to own a car, you'll need to consider additional expenses such as insurance, fuel, maintenance, and parking, which can amount to several hundred dollars per month.
- Food: Grocery expenses can range from \$200 to \$400 CAD per month, depending on personal choices and dietary preferences. Dining out or eating at restaurants can add an additional \$10 to \$30 CAD per meal.
- Education Expenses: Textbooks and educational materials can cost an average of \$500 to \$1,000 CAD per semester, depending on the program and courses.



It's important to budget for expenses like utilities, personal care items, mobile phone bills, and entertainment. Sometimes, leases do not include utilities and tenants are responsible for paying for heat, hydro, water, and gas. The cost of these utilities depends on your usage and the size/age of your home. Prior to signing your lease, you have the right to ask your landlord for an average of what monthly utility bills might be, or you can contact the utility provider for a more accurate estimate. Keep in mind that internet/Wi-Fi is not usually considered a utility in Ontario, so if your lease includes utilities, it's best to ask your landlord directly if this includes internet. If it doesn't, you'll need to budget for this expense separately.

It's advisable to carefully plan and manage your expenses while considering your personal financial situation.

TIME TO START PACKING

Before you begin packing for your travels to Canada, there are a few important things to consider:

Luggage and Customs

- Check the luggage restrictions specified by your airline.
- Familiarize yourself with the items that the Canadian Border Services Agency (CBSA) does not permit through Customs, such as firearms, pets, plants, fresh fruits and vegetables, and meat products.
- Avoid packing money or valuable items in your checked luggage.
- Include two sets of clothing in your hand luggage in case of flight delays or lost baggage during transit.
- Don't forget to pack your laptop and ensure you have the necessary phone adapters and voltage converters.

Power Plugs and Sockets

In Canada, the power plugs and sockets are of type A and B. The standard voltage is 120 V, and the standard frequency is 60 Hz. If you are bringing any electronic devices with you, it is likely that you will need a voltage converter to prevent damage. Consider obtaining a combined power plug adapter/voltage converter.

Essential Documents

Ensure you carry the following documents with you while travelling to Canada. However, remember to **NOT** place them in your checked luggage:

- Final official Georgian College Letter of Acceptance
- Enrollment letter from the college (for registered students only) <u>can be requested</u> on the <u>MyGCLife</u> student portal
- Official academic transcripts and degree certificates
- English language test scores
- International driver's license or driver's license from your home country
- Driving history (if you plan to buy a car in Canada)
- Immunization records (refer to page 14 for details)
- Student visa approval letter, also known as Point of Entry (POE) letter
- Passport
- Addresses and contact information for your accommodations in Canada

Note: Ensure that all documents in your native language are translated into English.

TIME TO Start Packing

Health Essentials

- Masks (optional)
- Gloves (optional)
- Vaccination records
- ArriveCAN documents (no longer mandatory but strongly encouraged)
- Small sanitizers
- Travel credit card
- Toothbrush
- Snacks (in checked luggage)

Clothing Recommendations

There is no strict dress code at Georgian College, so feel free to bring clothing that suits your personal style. However, keep in mind the changing seasons and varying weather conditions in Canada.

Summer – Lightweight clothing and sun protection is ideal as temperatures can often be above 30 degrees.

Spring and fall – It's useful to have sweaters and light waterproof jackets for cooler and rainy days. **Winter** – Heavy jackets, scarves, gloves, hats, and waterproof boots are essential. Layering is common as it can be cold outside but warmer indoors.



Can I buy everything when I get there?

Absolutely! We suggest purchasing larger or heavier items after your arrival, particularly if you have a luggage allowance. Each campus community has everything you might require available locally.

SELECTING WINTER CLOTHING

Ensuring you are well-prepared for the cold weather in Canada is essential to stay warm and comfortable throughout the winter season. Embracing the beauty of winter becomes easier when you are bundled up in cozy layers. So, remember to dress appropriately and stay snug as you explore and experience the wonders of the Canadian winter.

Scarves - Opt for a thick, insulating material such as wool or fleece. Look for scarves that are long enough to wrap around your neck and cover your face if needed.

Hats - Choose a hat that fully covers your ears and head to protect against cold winds. Look for hats made from warm materials like wool or thermal fleece.

Gloves/mittens - Look for gloves or mittens that are lined with a warm and insulating material like fleece or thermal insulation. Consider gloves with touchscreen-compatible fingertips, allowing you to use your smartphone without removing them. Look for waterproof or water-resistant gloves if you'll be exposed to snow or rain.

Winter coat - When selecting a coat, prioritize good insulation (goose down or synthetic) to keep you warm in freezing temperatures. Look for a coat that is both windproof and water-resistant or waterproof, providing protection against harsh and wet weather conditions.

Boots - Pick waterproof or water-resistant boots to keep your feet dry in snowy or wet conditions. Look for boots with good traction to prevent slipping on icy surfaces. Consider boots with insulation and a warm lining to keep your feet cozy in cold temperatures.

Remember to prioritize quality, durability, and proper fit when selecting your winter clothing items to ensure they effectively protect you from the cold weather. Additionally, layering your clothing and wearing thermal socks and thermal base layers can provide extra warmth and comfort during the winter season.





ADDITIONAL

Learn about Canadian money

While Canadian cash is not necessary, having some on hand can be useful as a backup in case of any issues with your bank cards. Familiarize yourself with Canadian currency through the <u>Government of</u> <u>Canada website</u>.

Banking

If you're a student in Canada looking for a chequing account for your daily expenses, there are five common banks that offer this service. While the features of these accounts are similar, there may be some slight variations between banks. To learn more about the options available to you and the requirements for opening an account, you can use the links provided below.

Bank of Montreal (BMO) Royal Bank of Canada (RBC) Canadian Imperial Bank of Canada (CIBC) Scotiabank Toronto-Dominion Bank (TD)

Some banks even offer appointment booking to reduce your wait time at the branch. Take some time to explore the websites and choose the bank that meets your needs best.

Budgeting for students

It's important for you to learn how to budget your money every month in order to have sufficient funds for your living expenses. Mobile phones

If you plan on bringing your mobile phone with you to Canada, it's important to ensure that it will work on the local mobile networks. Here are the steps to check if your phone is compatible:


- 1. Go to willmyphonework.net

- Bell, Telus, Fido, and Virgin Mobile) under 'Carriers'.5. Click on 'Search'.

6. The results will display which networks your phone can work with.
