

### Part-time Program Delivery Schedule Honours Bachelor of Business Administration (Management and Leadership) (BBML) 2024-2031

#### **Completion timelines**

The Honours Bachelor of Business Administration (Management and Leadership) degree is a Fall/Winter program. The Program Map found on the following page shows when courses are offered and when in the program sequence you can take them. It also ensures you complete pre-requisite courses early in your program.

During the summer months, although not listed on the Program Map, you are able to take some of your noncore courses. As well, some of your core business electives may also be available. This changes from year to year so please be sure to plan accordingly.

# The degree can be completed in 6 – 8 years part time, by taking 2 – 3 courses during the Fall and Winter semesters combined with occasionally taking a summer course(s).

#### Graduation Requirements: 40 courses, 2 Co-op Work Terms

#### What are Core Courses?

These are courses specific to your discipline – which is Business. Some of them are <u>Mandatory</u> and have been chosen for you, and some are Elective. This means you may choose courses from an approved list.

- 27 Core Courses (Mandatory)
- 5 Elective Core Courses

#### What are Non-Core Courses?

These are courses outside your main field of study and are required in all degree programs. Some of them are <u>Mandatory</u> and some are Elective.

- 2 Non-Core Courses (Mandatory)
- 6 Elective Non-Core Courses

#### <u>CO-OP – 2 Co-op Work Terms</u>

All co-operative education programs at Georgian contain mandatory work term experiences aligned with program learning outcomes. Co-op work terms are designed to integrate academic learning with work experience, supporting the development of industry specific competencies and employability skills.

Georgian College holds membership with, and endeavours to follow, the co-operative education guidelines set out by the Co-operative Education and Work Integrated Learning Canada (CEWIL) and Education at Work Ontario (EWO) as supported by the Ministry of Colleges and Universities.

Co-op is facilitated as a supported, competitive job search process. Students are required to complete a Co-op and Career Preparation course scheduled prior to their first co-op work term. Students engage in an active co-op job search that includes applying to positions posted by Co-op Consultants, and personal networking. Co-op work terms are scheduled according to a formal sequence that alternates academic and co-op semesters as shown in the program progression below.

Programs may have additional requirements such as a valid driver's license, strong communication skills, industry specific certifications, and ability to travel. Under exceptional circumstances, a student may be unable to complete the program progression as shown below. Please refer to Georgian College Academic Regulation 3.2.7: *Changes in program, course, section or co-op,* for details.

International co-op work terms are supported and encouraged, when aligned with program requirements.

Typically, students complete COOP1038 after completing Semester 4. Part-time students can complete the coop during or after Semester 4.

COOP2032 is typically completed after Semester 6 courses are completed.

All students must complete CPHR0001 – Co-op hour – 2 semesters prior to starting a co-op.
